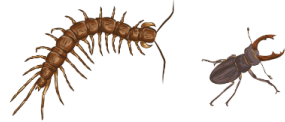
Project Spotlight

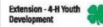
The FCC, or Federal Communication Commission, can't help everyone get fast internet unless they know all the places the internet is installed and how fast it is in each location.

Storing Potatoes in Cold Temperatures

Ideally, potatoes should be stored in a cool garage or basement where the relative humidity is 90% and the temperature is between 40- and 45-degrees F. Although they can be stored for long periods of time in temperatures below 40-degrees F, the starches begin converting to sugars, which alters the flavor of the potatoes. If this happens in your storage area, keep the potatoes at room temperature for two to three days prior to consuming and the desired flavor should return. If stored above 45-degrees F for prolonged periods of time, the potatoes will begin to sprout. Potatoes will become soft and shriveled if the relative humidity is too low. Storing potatoes in perforated plastic bags will help maintain higher humidity levels.

Preventing Ice Dams on Eaves

Ice dams along eaves may cause considerable damage to the roof and inside walls of a house.

Poorly insulated attics are the chief cause of ice build-up on eaves. Ice forms when the snow melts off a warm roof, runs down to the eave line, and refreezes there. Ice in the eave trough prevents water from running off freely. If water backs up high enough, it may seep under shingles and down into the house. Sometimes it leaks through plaster walls and ceilings.

Ice dams are usually a problem only on cold days when the roof is warmer than the eave overhang. On warm days the snow melts at the same rate on the eaves and water runs off freely.

To Prevent Ice Dams:

- 1) Insulate between the top floor ceiling and the attic, or along the underside of the eaves if the attic is used as living space. This is the best way to prevent heat loss through the attic roof. Insulation will also help cut fuel bills.
- 2) Ventilate the attic through eave soffits, louvers, and roof ventilators. Use one square foot of ventilation opening (inlets and outlets) for every 150 square feet of attic floor. Provide half of this in the eave and half at the ridge.
- 3) Use electric heating cables along the eaves if insulation or ventilation is not possible.

Cables can be strung out along the edge of eaves. When plugged in, they will heat the area, melt any ice already formed, and prevent further freezing when water drips off the roof. Be sure cables are approved for the intended use by Underwriters Laboratory (UL). Check with your electrician for correct installation.

Do not use salt to melt snow or ice from the roof! Salt will rust nails and damage gutters and downspouts.

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Captain Cash was created and developed by Purdue Extension and meets Indiana Academic Standards for math and social studies. Each session is led by a trained Purdue Extension educator.

Financial Concepts for Young Children

It is never too early for children to learn how to become eager earners, savvy savers, wise spenders, and careful borrowers. This financial literacy program engages children in money-smart activities and takes them down the road to financial fitness.

All Washington County Public Schools partnered with Purdue Extension Educators to bring “Captain Cash” into their third-grade classrooms. Bradie Shrum Elementary and East Washington Elementary are currently scheduled to sail with Captain Cash in February. Each student will participate in four class sessions with take home parent newsletters given at the end of each lesson.

Newsletters contain suggested at-home games and activities that focus on earning, saving, planned spending, and wise borrowing of money. Each session introduces money-related vocabulary words and teaches money concepts that are based on Indiana Academic Standards for Math and Social Studies.

This program is free and provided by your Washington County Extension Educators. If you would like to learn more about “Captain Cash” for your school or organization, contact Sonya Mitchell, your HHS educator. Remember, good financial habits start young!



2023 Reflections

This 12-week program was held in three Washington County Communities during 2023. “Here’s To Our Health!” was held in Salem, Campbellsburg, and Pekin. Participants met weekly to receive healthy living information (with a focus on nutrition), resources, recipes, cooking demonstrations, taste tests and culinary giveaways to further support healthy cooking eating. Some of the items participants received included: crockpots, utensil sets, vegetable choppers, digital kitchen thermometers, knife sets, cutting boards. In addition to kitchen items, participants also received a locally sourced healthy meal kit for a family of four.

The twelfth and final session of the program is a three month reunion session in which participants share their successes and challenges in applying what they have learned from their participation in the “Here’s To Our Health!” program. This final session also included a variety
