FairEntry

4-H Members are required to enter their projects in FairEntry (washcoin.fairentry.com). This is the process where you indicate which static (4-H building) and livestock projects you are bringing to the fair and choose livestock show classes. FairEntry opens May 16th and projects must be entered by June 1st. More information will be sent to 4-H families in May. If you have questions or need assistance, please let us know.

Important Livestock Information

Sheep/Goat ID

Sheep and Goat ID Day is Thursday, April 27th from 5-7 p.m. at the fair-grounds. Please review the 2023 4-H Handbook to determine which animals must come to ID Day to be weighed and tagged. More information will be sent to Sheep and Goat project members in April. Please let us know if you have questions.

Online Animal Enrollment by May 15th

The following livestock must be enrolled in 4HOnline by May 15th: beef, dairy, dairy beef, goats, horses, rabbits, sheep, swine. Fair class designations must be made for ALL species in FairEntry by June 1st.

• Animals Exhibiting at the Indiana State Fair

4-H members planning to exhibit swine, cattle, sheep, and/or goats to the Indiana State Fair this year must have a DNA Hair Sample turned into the Extension Office by May 15th. Sample envelopes and instructions are available at the Extension office. Visit www.indianastatefair.com for more information and to sign up for the Indiana State Fair.

• Indiana 4-H Quality Livestock Care (QLC)

Indiana 4-H has created a new program for members showing livestock. This is comparable to the YQCA program that our members have been required to take in the past. QLC or YQCA is required for members in grades 3-12 showing beef, dairy, dairy beef, goats, poultry, rabbits, sheep and swine. Washington County will offer the in-person QLC training on the following dates:

Wednesday, April 19 at 6:30pm Wednesday, May 10 at 6:30pm Wednesday, May 31 at 1:30pm

The QLC fee is \$3 per member and is due the day of the training. The Washington County 4-H Council has agreed to cover the \$3 fee for all Washington County 4-H livestock members. To register for one of the trainings, please contact the Extension office. There is no online option for the QLC training.

Since this is the first year for this program, YQCA certification will also be accepted; however, YQCA training will not be given in person. It can be completed online at yqcaprogram.org. A certificate of completion must be turned in to the Extension office if this option is chosen. If you have any questions, please let us know.

There is only one project record sheet for most static (4-H Building) projects. Livestock projects, Horse & Pony and Junior Leaders still have separate record sheets.


Project manuals are only distributed by request, where available. 4-H members are NOT required to complete manual activities, however, manuals are a valuable educational supplement for 4-H members.

New Restricted Use Pesticide Rules

Farmers and commercial applicators are some of the most responsible users of pesticides with testing, continuing education credits, and extensive record keeping as part of the process of obtaining and maintaining an applicator license. In response to recent federal rule changes adopted by the Environmental Protection Agency, the Office of the Indiana State Chemist (OISC) has adopted comparable rules for applicators in Indiana. The rule changes went into effect on January 4, 2023 and are related to applicator certification, supervision of general use pesticide (GUP) applicators, and restricted use pesticide (RUP) record keeping. All farmers and commercial applicators are encouraged to visit the OISC website for detailed information at https://oisc.purdue.edu/. A few highlights from the rule changes include:

- Only certified applicators are allowed to use RUP. This includes both
 private applicators (farmers) and commercial applicators. Private applicators must pass the CORE exam to be certified. Commercial applicators
 must pass the CORE exam and a CATEGORY exam. Exam information
 is available through the Extension office, Purdue Pesticide Programs, and
 the OISC.
- RUP use is defined as any part of the application process, which includes mixing, loading, applying, cleaning application equipment, and disposal.
- Certified commercial applicators may supervise the use of GUP by non-certified applicators if the non-certified applicator is a Registered Technician or the certified applicator is physically and continuously on-site with the non-certified applicator during use. The certified applicator must also provide the non-certified applicator with training, personal protective equipment, and the product label for each application.
- A few items were added to the list of records already being kept by applicators. The most notable addition is the start and stop time for each application. RUP businesses also have record keeping changes.

The OISC also recently provided guidance for dicamba use in Indiana for 2023. Any product with at least 6.5% dicamba is a RUP. The three over-the-top soybean herbicides (Engenia, Tavium, and Xtendimax) have an application cutoff date of June 12, 2023 in Indiana. The other RUP dicamba products have an application cutoff date of June 20, 2023. More information about dicamba use in Indiana is available at the OISC website at https://oisc.purdue.edu/pesticide/dicamba.html.

Soil Temperature & Vegetables

One of the most neglected tools for vegetable gardeners is a soil thermometer. Soil temperature is a much better measure of when to plant than air temperature or the calendar. Planting when soil is too cool, it can cause some seeds to rot and transplants to sit there.

A number of vegetables can germinate and grow at cool temperatures. For example, peas will germinate and grow well at a soil temperature of 40 F. Though lettuce, parsnips, and spinach can sprout at a soil temperature of 35 F, they prefer at least 45 F for best germination and growth. Radishes also do well at a soil temperature of 45 F. Even if the seeds of these cool-season crops are planted below the recommended soil temperature, the seed will rarely rot.

Warm-season crops such as tomatoes, sweet corn and beans are different. They prefer at least 55 F for germination (or transplanting), but others such as peppers, cucumbers, melons and sweet potatoes need it even warmer, about 60 F. If planted when soils are too cool, they likely will rot before germinating.

Taking soil temperature accurately is a bit of a science. First, use a thermometer with a metal probe. These are sold in many garden, auto parts and hardware stores. Those in auto parts stores are used to measure the temperature inside air conditioning ducts and are often less expensive than those used for gardening. Take the temperature 2.5 inches deep at about 10 to 11 a.m. Temperature variations throughout the day and night affect soil temperature, with lowest readings after dawn and warmest around mid-afternoon. The late-morning reading gives a good average temperature. If taking the soil temperature at this time is not practical, take a reading before you leave for work and a second when you return home and use the average. Also be sure to get a consistent reading for four to five days in a row before planting, and make sure a cold snap is not predicted.
