Career Advancement Scholarship

Indiana Extension Homemakers Association, is an organization affiliated with the Cooperative Extension Service and Purdue University and is interested in furthering education, leadership and community volunteerism. Steps to Success Scholarship

Scholarship Guidelines:

- 1. Applicant must be a resident of the State of Indiana
- Applicant must be admitted or be enrolled in an accredited college or university or an accredited vocational or technical program. This should be a twoyear program earning an industry certification in the chosen field.
- Vocational and technical scholarship applicants must include a letter from school advisor stating that candidate is on track for graduation.
- 4. Attach the following to completed application:
 - Two (2) character reference letters from persons not related to you.
 - o Official High School transcript of courses completed, including GPA and class rank.
 - A copy of the College/School acceptance letter, if courses have not started.
 - A copy of acceptance letter to an accredited vocational/technical school.
 - A letter of recommendation from your primary technical instructor or director.
 - A 500-word essay describing the life skills applicant has developed through high school community involvement. Include educational background, financial need, volunteer or community service activities and how applicant would benefit from this scholarship.
- Applications must be postmarked by May 1 to be considered. Applications postmarked after May 1 will not be considered.
- Five (5) \$500 scholarships will be given: (4) to an applicant admitted to or enrolled in a state accredited college or university and (1) to a state accredited vocational and technical program.

Tips to Build Your Finances

Often times, January is a month of reflection on the previous year. The past few years have financially strained many of us. Many dealt with hardships and heartaches brought on by the pandemic. Some of us were riding in the front seat of an emotional and financial rollercoaster. Now that the holidays have come to a close, I challenge you to think about how you can improve your finances in 2023. A New Year means new beginnings and a fresh start. Here are a few financial tips to help you start the year off well and financially get yourself on track!

Tip 1: Build back your savings better! Di you find yourself taking money from your savings account in order to make ends meet? Make 2023 the year where you build back your savings and don't have to do this the entire year! To help you more and spend less, ask yourself "Will this purchase make my life better?" If the answer is no, or if it will just add clutter to your home then rethink the purchase! To help you save better, start small by doing things such as: eliminating your morning coffee run and brewing a pot at home instead, preparing and cooking meals at home rather than getting take-out, evaluating your cell phone plan and researching to see if there is a better bargain. I recommend that you take the money that you would normally spend for these activities and place it in your saving account! You will be pleasantly surprised at how quickly your balance will grow! For example, if you spend \$6 every morning on coffee, you could be saving \$2,190 at the end of the year!

Tip 2: Establish an emergency fund (or continue to add to it)! Yes I know, creating or continuing to add money into an emergency fund doesn't sound like fun because you can't enjoy it. However, an emergency fund is one of the most important things that you can save for. This fund can help provide you with peace of mind. Knowing that if your car unexpectedly breaks down, you will have the money to pay for it and you won't have to dig yourself into a deeper financial hole by having to pay for the unexpected expense! What does yours look like?

Tip 3: Commit to reducing your debt! Reducing your debt is like losing weight: it is difficult to do, but so satisfying when you accomplish your weight loss goal. If you have multiple credit cards, which one do you focus on first? Instead of focusing on the credit card with the highest balance, I recommend focusing on paying off the credit cards that have the highest interest rate first! Just like seeing pounds shed off, making small changes can start becoming a positive habit and can make it easier for you to continue with the program!

Tip 4: Understand where your money goes! If you track exactly where your money is going, it will give you a better idea of where your overall financial picture stands and will help you determine what areas you should cut to help trim your debt and increase your savings. Simple understanding where your money is going can help reduce anxiety, which in turn can start to reduce financial stress. There are several different ways and applications to help you track spending. Of course, there is still the old-fashioned paper and pencil method for those of you who prefer this way of tracking your spending!

Tip 5: Focus on experiences instead of "things!" Rather than buying that new pair of shoes or outfit, revisit all of your options. What experience are you going to get from purchasing the new pair of shoes? You could sign up for a virtual cooking class, learn a new language, attend a group fitness class, register for an event, or go on a daylong or weekend road trip! These options will provide you with experiences, rather than "things." Some of these options still require spending money, but focusing on experiences can help reduce stress and burnout while providing you with positive experiences. Set yourself up! Ask yourself: How can I reduce my financial anxiety and get back on track to building my finances in 2023?

What Exactly is Electric Programmable Pressure Cookina (EPPC)?

It's a food-preparation method that seals the food inside a vessel with liquid, using heat to create steam, which increases the pressure in the electric programmable vessel.

- Steam is trapped in the pot, raising the pressure, which increases the boiling point.
- Increased boiling point=faster cook time, i.e. pulled pork in the oven can take ~6 hours...but in the EPPC only ~2 hours!
- Because the pot stays closed and loses hardly any moisture, you can use less liquid and the flavors become more concentrated.
- Some foods do not necessarily cook faster, i.e. potatoes due to the extra time it takes for the EPPC to build up pressure prior to cookina.



- The benefit of using an EPPC to cook this type of food would be the consistent outcome of the product.
- Another example and a surprise to me, was cooking eggs under pressure! It does not really save time cooking hard-boiled eggs in the EPPC, but the eggs peel so easily after cooking under pressure.

Hard Cooked Eggs in the EPPC:

- Place 1 cup water in inner pots EPPC. Add in egg or steam rack and carefully set a number of eggs according to EPPC directions on or in rack.
- Place lid on EPPC and set for cook time for 5 minutes on high/low pressure according to EPPC directions. NOTE: Using high pressure to make hard cooked eggs, though the eggs are beautifully cooked with egg white and yolks fully set, the difference with fresh eggs, but it gets noticeable with older eggs.
- 3. After cook time has elapsed, let pressure release naturally for 5 minutes.
- One 4 minutes has elapsed, release any remaining pressure in EPPC by using wooden spoon to move vent knob to vent position.
- 5. Carefully, remove eggs from pressure cooker and place in ice bath for up to 5 minutes. Eggs are VERY hot, use pot holder or tongs to transfer eggs to ice water.
- 6. Remove eggs from ice bath, peel and enjoy.

Cook's Tip: The thing you'll need to know is how to release the pressure one the pressure cooker has finished cooking. The easiest way is to do nothing and let the pressure release all by itself.

ALL animals to be exhibited at the Whitley County 4-H Fair and the Indiana State Fair must be enrolled in 4-H Online by May 15, 2023.

4-H Enrollment Reminder!!!

Are you or your kids enrolled in 4-H yet? Enrollment has been open for about three months now!! Please don't forget to enroll or re-enroll by January 15th!! Visit www.v2.4honline.com to get enrolled for the 2022-2023 4-H year!! Don't hesitate to contact the Extension Office if you need help!

Those 4-H members who will be involved in livestock projects need to be enrolled by January 15th in order to not miss important livestock project deadlines and events.

Internet note: 4HOnline no longer supports Internet Explorer 10 and older due to security concerns. Please make sure that you use Firefox, Google Chrome, or Safari when accessing 4HOnline and FairEntry.

Premise ID Info

Anyone who buys, sells or exhibits livestock must have a Premise ID. A Premise ID is an identification number for the physical location in which animals are housed and is necessary to protect animal agriculture and the livestock industry. In an emergency, animal health officials will be able to rapidly communicate disease spread with producers. All 4-Hers are required to know the Premise ID number for the property in which their animals are located and this number is recorded in 4-H Online when enrolling the animals to be exhibited at the 4-H Fair and Indiana State Fair.

If you own a horse or poultry it is strongly encouraged for you to get a

Premise ID number, but it is not required to exhibit at this time.

If you do not currently have a premise ID number, you may apply for one through the Indiana State Board of Animal Heath at http://www.in.gov/boah for the quickest response or call (317) 544-2400.

You MUST have a premise ID to show at the Whitley County 4-H Fair and the Indiana State Fair for cattle, swine, goats and sheep.

4-H Scholarships Opportunities



- 4-H Senior Year Scholarship: 4-H members who are seniors in High School may apply for this one-time award to use for a post high school study or training. Approximately 150 scholarships selected.
- Indiana 4-H Accomplishment: 4-H members who are in grade 10 through the year following the final year of 4-H eligibility. There are ten different projects/activity-based categories, with a \$1,000 minimum award per category. Finalists will be interviewed in the Spring at Purdue University. At least 20 scholarships are selected.
- 4-H Club Scholarship: 4-H members who are seniors in High School and have participated in 4-H at least 4 years. Student must enroll in the College of Agriculture or College of Health and Human Sciences at Purdue University, West Lafayette and have a FASFA application submitted by March 1 to receive this scholarship. Scholarships are

awarded on the basis of (1) scholastic ability; (2) financial need; (3) achievement in 4-H club work. Scholarships must be used no later than the first fall semester after the scholarship awards are announced.

AG Plus Scholarship

Who: Any local high school senior or college student in their freshman, sophomore, or junior year of studies and is pursuing a career in agriculture in any 2-year or 4-year college in an agriculture curriculum. Basis of Scholarship: Scholastic, leadership and must major in an agricultural field that includes forage, turf or landscape related programs. Amount: \$1000 - Deadline: February 28, 2023

Youth Loans

The Farm Service Agency makes loans to youth to establish and operate agricultural income-producing projects in connection with 4-H



projects in connection with 4-H clubs, FFA and other agricultural groups. Projects must be planned and operated with the help of the organization advisor, produce sufficient income to repay the loan and provide the youth with practical business and educational experience. The maximum loan amount is \$5,000.

Youth Loan Eligibility Requirements:

- Be a citizen of the United States (which includes Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands) or a legal resident alien
- Be 10 years to 20 years of age
- Comply with FSA's general eligibility requirements
- Be unable to get a loan from other sources
- Conduct a modest income-producing project in a supervised program of work as outlined above
- Demonstrate capability of planning, managing and operating the project under guidance and assistance from a project advisor. The project supervisor must recommend the youth loan applicant, along with providing adequate supervision.




