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




Purdue Fast Start



Learn Best Practices at Pond & Fish Management Workshop

Learn how to get the best out of your fishing pond at Purdue Extension's Pond & Fish Management Workshop on May 13 from 6:00–8:00 p.m. at the Whitley County Ag Museum (on the grounds of the Whitley Co. 4-H Fairgrounds), 680 W. Squawbuck Road, Columbia City, IN.



The public is invited to learn from two of Purdue Extension's most knowledgeable Extension Educators on pond management and fish management. David Osborne, Extension Educator in Ripley County, and Jonathan Ferris, Extension Educator in Wayne County, will be sharing their training and experience.

Subjects to be covered include understanding the pond ecosystem, managing aquatic vegetation, pond maintenance, fish species best suited to Indiana ponds, fish stocking rates, and fish population management.

Anyone may attend, but landowners with ponds should find the information particularly helpful. Emphasis will be placed on managing ponds for fish.

What Are Extension Homemakers, You Ask?

Extension Homemakers are an Indiana statewide organization, begun in 1913. Whitley County's group was organized in 1924 as a Women's Auxiliary of the Farm Bureau. A constitution was drawn up and accepted on July 2 of this year and stayed in effect until 1952 at which time anyone could become a member not just those affiliated with the Farm Bureau. Further revisions were made in 1972 in order to comply with the Civil Rights Laws of Membership Affirmative Action and remains in effect today.

Whitley County Extension Homemakers, in 1924, consisted of 9 clubs with 243 members. The objectives of this group back then were educational in nature and served to promote the advancement of home and community life along with encouraging children to achieve the highest ideals in citizenship through the 4-H program.

Along with the educational aspect, fund raising projects were begun in the late 1960's by serving meals to community groups with profits used for a variety of activities. Today, fundraising is predominantly focused on scholarships for high school seniors and an assortment of other community service projects.

Extension Homemakers have always been involved with the 4-H Fair. The early groups began serving food in the shelter house with a menu consisting of hot beef, hot dogs, sloppy joes and have become known for their pies. A fund to build a new building was begun, and in 1953, the 4-H Center, we know today, opened complete with a new kitchen to prepare food for the fair. The favorite hot beef sandwiches and homemade pies continue to be served and a variety of daily dinners were added to the menu. To this day, the Extension Homemakers still volunteer to cook and serve food for the fair.

Today, many annual functions (some begun over 20 years ago), bring in the needed revenue to finance projects such as: 4-H Fair Adult Open Show, Holiday Craft Bazaar and the spring and fall Garage Sale are the biggest.

It is interesting, but concerning, to note that in 1951, the statewide membership in Extension Homemakers was 58,800 individuals consisting of 2,220 clubs; however, in 2020, that number has dwindled to only 6,664 members throughout the state. In order to become a bigger presence in our community and be of service to all, it has become necessary to focus on increasing our membership.

How Can You Spot Identity Theft?

You probably know of someone who has been a victim of identity theft. So, what can you do to protect yourself? I recommend reading your statements from credit card companies, banks, and/or credit unions. I also recommend checking credit reports for suspicious activity. When you look at your statements, look closely for charges you did not make. Even a small charge can be a dangerous sign! Thieves sometimes will take a small amount from your checking account and then return to take much more if the small debit goes unnoticed.

Did you know that there are three different major credit bureaus where you can check your credit reports? They are Equifax, Experian, and Transunion. If an identity thief is opening financial accounts in your name, these accounts will most likely show up on your credit report. Be on the lookout for inquiries from companies you've never contacted, accounts you didn't open, and wrong amounts on your accounts.

Tip: Be sure that all of your personal information is correct! If you have a problem with your credit report, submit a complaint by visiting https://www.consumerfinance.gov/complaint/

Garlic Herb Chicken, Asparagus and Cauliflower Rice

Garlic Herb Chicken & Asparagus Ingredients:

2 teaspoons onion powder

1 teaspoon minced garlic

11/2 teaspoons Italian seasoning

½ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper 2 Tablespoons olive oil

1-pound boneless and skinless chicken thighs (about 4)

11/2 pounds trimmed asparagus, woody ends removed

Cauliflower Rice Ingredients:

2-2½ pounds cauliflower, 1-2 heads depending on size

1 Tablespoon olive oil

½ teaspoon salt

½ teaspoon garlic powder

1 teaspoon onion powder

½ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper



Be sure to wash your hands and have a clean surface before you begin cooking.

- Preheat the oven to 450 degrees F and line two baking sheets with parchment paper. For the chicken and asparagus, mix the onion powder, minced garlic, Italian seasoning, pepper, and olive oil until combined.
- Place the chicken thighs on the end of the baking sheet. Then arrange the trimmed asparagus spears on the other end.
- Next divide the garlic herb mixture evenly over the two, and bake until the chicken is done. This should be about 25 minutes, or until chicken reaches 165 degrees F. If you have thin asparagus, add it to the pan during the last 10 minutes of cooking, so it doesn't overcook.
- Meanwhile, let's make the cauliflower rice. To make rice out of a whole head of cauliflower, trim away the outer leaves. Then cut the florets from the core. Break up any large pieces, (over 2") and place the florets into a large food processor. I recommend doing this in 2 batches.
 - Tip: You'll need about 2-2½ pounds of cauliflower or 1-2 heads depending on the size. This will yield 1½ pounds or about 7 cups of cauliflower rice.
- After you make your rice, toss it together with the olive oil, salt, garlic powder, onion powder, and pepper. Spread it evenly on one of the prepared baking sheets. When the chicken and asparagus are done, remove them from the oven to cook slightly. Then put your prepared cauliflower rice sheet in the oven. Bake for 10-
- 15 minutes, or until tender.
- Once the rice is done, let cool for 5-10 minutes. Add rice to bowl, then top with asparagus and chicken.

Notes:

- If you choose to not make your cauliflower rice, you can purchase this at your local grocery in the pantry or frozen food section!
- To store place any leftovers from dinner into a sealed container and refrigerate for up to 4 days.
- Reheat place the leftovers into a small skillet with a touch of water and heat covered over medium heat until warmed through making sure the pan doesn't run dry. Or you can microwave the leftovers.
- To freeze I don't recommend freezing the asparagus or cauliflower rice because they come out mushy. You can freeze any leftover chicken in an airtight container for up to 3 months though!

Helpful Hints on 4-H Posters & Notebooks

All 4-H posters (regardless of project) must be displayed horizontal. Think of a 4-H exhibit poster like a dollar bill. You read the dollar bill horizontally and a poster is the same way.

- POSTERS MUST HAVE A HARD BACKING to make them stand when placed on the display easel. Use cardboard, foam board or lightweight wood.
- BE AWARE OF THE SIZE OF FOAM BOARD. A lot of foam board poster board for sale is 20"X30" this is the wrong size do not use! Your poster must be 22"X28". Foam poster board can be used if it correctly measures the 22"X28" size. The 22"X28" foam poster board is available at the Extension Office. Price is \$4.00 per poster board.
- REMEMBER TO COVER YOUR POSTER with clear plastic for protection. Heavy duty acetate is available at hardware stores. Poster sleeves (\$1.00) and Salon print sleeves (\$.50) are available at the Extension Office
- Please accommodate layout of poster to support 4-H Fair Entry tag 2-7/8" wide x 5-1/2" length in the lower right-hand corner.

Road and Farm Safety this Spring

Be patient and safe on roads during the spring planting season.

Slow-moving vehicle emblems should be displayed on farm equipment and other slow-moving vehicles. An SMV emblem is a triangle shape, with an orange fluorescent center and red reflective borders. Equipment and other vehicles displaying this emblem are capable of speeds no faster than 25 miles per hour. Driving at road speed, the gap between you and the equipment will close quickly, so immediate caution and slower speeds are prudent.

Most farmers have had some significant days in the farm shop to get equipment ready. However, I'd urge farmers to recheck the condition of SMV emblems to make sure they are still fluorescent. Over time, these emblems can fade, become less noticeable, and need replacing.

Other road-related safety equipment, such as headlights, taillights, flashing lights, hitch pins, tires, and wheel bearings also should be checked.

Large equipment should be fully folded to transport position for the safety of the farmer and other drivers when moving from field to field over the road.

Coupling road hazards with general farming risks, farming is a dangerous operation.

According to the Purdue University Agricultural Safety and Health Program's 2021 Indiana Farm Fatality Summary with Historical Overview, "The 20 documented fatalities in 2021 are a decrease from the 25 cases identified in 2020 and the fewest in the past eight years, reflecting the continuing historical trend of a declining number of annual fatalities." While any loss of life is tragic, the trend is good news.

However, the relatively few Indiana non-fatal farm-related injuries that were identified in 2021 as part of the fatality surveillance efforts were generally severe, including loss of a limb or head injuries. They may also have involved the use of medical helicopters for transport to a trauma center.

A disproportionate share of farm fatalities come from small or hobby farms and Amish/Old Order populations. Some of the risks include horses as a primary power source, bulls for breeding, and older machinery that does not meet current safety standards. On small or hobby farms, this especially includes older tractors without roll-over protective structures (ROPS).

Identified hazards on other farms included older, non-ROPS equipped tractors and self-propelled mowers on steep grades; working in wood lots and tree felling on farms; ATV and UTV operation on farms; working with livestock, including horses and bulls; and extra riders on equipment.

Spotted Lanternfly in Indiana

The state websites seem to be lagging a bit as far as the

current distribution of spotted lanternfly in Indiana. The bottom line is that they could be anywhere and we'd like to ask you to help us scout for spotted lanternfly now. The most at-risk sites appear to be railroad corridors bordered by tree-of-heaven trees.

Especially at-risk among those sites would be places where the railcars sit idle for extended periods. New nymphs will be hatching out soon to crawl around on tree-of-heaven and other plants. If you see this little black insect with white polka-dots, please let us know, or report your finds at https://www.eddmaps.org/.

Although their preferred host is treeof-heaven, this is a devasting insect of grape, and can also affect fruit trees, hardwood trees, and other plants. Although SLF feeds on over 100 host plants, not all of these incur economic damage. Grapes are the primary crop of concern according to our current understanding.

<u>Changes to Pesticide Applicator</u> <u>Rules (Again)</u>

Last year, several pesticide application rule changes were announced by the Office of the Indiana State Chemist (OISC), focused primarily on supervision, Registered Technicians (RTs), and record-keeping. These rule changes were also covered in Private Applicator Recertification Programs (PARPs) throughout the year, as instructed by OISC. Since then, further modifications have been made to some of these policies, especially regarding RTs and supervision as it relates to the application of restricted-use pesticides(RUPs). <u>Do You Need to Obtain a Pesticide</u> <u>Applicator License?</u>
