
Master Gardeners' Garden Walk June 25

What Are Extension Homemakers, You Ask?

Extension Homemakers are an Indiana statewide organization, begun in 1913. Whitley County's group was organized in 1924 as a Women's Auxiliary of the Farm Bureau. A constitution was drawn up and accepted on July 2 of this year and stayed in effect until 1952 at which time anyone could become a member not just those affiliated with the Farm Bureau. Further revisions were made in 1972 in order to comply with the Civil Rights Laws of Membership Affirmative Action and remains in effect today.

Whitley County Extension Homemakers, in 1924, consisted of 9 clubs with 243 members. The objectives of this group back then were educational in nature and served to promote the advancement of home and community life along with encouraging children to achieve the highest ideals in citizenship through the 4-H program.

Along with the educational aspect, fund raising projects were begun in the late 1960's by serving meals to community groups with profits used for a variety of activities. Today, fundraising is predominantly focused on scholarships for high school seniors and an assortment of other community service projects.

Extension Homemakers have always been involved with the 4-H Fair. The early groups began serving food in the shelter house with a menu consisting of hot beef, hot dogs, sloppy joes and have become known for their pies. A fund to build a new building was begun, and in 1953, the 4-H Center, we know today, opened complete with a new kitchen to prepare food for the fair. The favorite hot beef sandwiches and homemade pies continue to be served and a variety of daily dinners were added to the menu. To this day, the Extension Homemakers still volunteer to cook and serve food for the fair.

Today, many annual functions (some begun over 20 years ago), bring in the needed revenue to finance projects such as: 4-H Fair Adult Open Show, Holiday Craft Bazaar and the spring and fall Garage Sale are the biggest.

It is interesting, but concerning, to note that in 1951, the statewide membership in Extension Homemakers was 58,800 individuals consisting of 2,220 clubs; however, in 2020, that number has dwindled to only 6,664 members throughout the state. In order to become a bigger presence in our community and be of service to all, it has become necessary to focus on increasing our membership.

Spring Cleaning Your Home

coming home to a house that's so clean it practically sparkles. Cleaning your home from top to bottom can be overwhelming... not to mention, tiring and timeconsuming. I recommend starting by cleaning room by room or appliance by appliance with spring <u>cleaning tips</u> from organizing and cleaning pros. Whether you only have five minutes to freshen things up or you happen to have an entire weekend to spare, I want to help you accomplish some spring cleaning! Here are ten research-based cleaning tips to give

your home's nooks and crannies a much-needed refresh! (1) Clean your doormats. You can trap more dirt by using two mats, one outside the door and one inside. To refresh, hose off and air-dry outdoor mats. <u>Vacuum</u> indoor ones on both sides, going over the back will push trapped dirt out onto the floor where it will be easier to pick up.

(2) Spray down windows and dust blinds. Wait for an overcast day to <u>clean your windows</u> and start on the shady side of the house (direct sun can lead to streaking). Try raising your blinds or shades and then wash the windows with glass cleaner and a microfiber cloth. Then lower the blinds and vinyl shades and dust with a duster and finish by vacuuming the fabric shades and drapes.

(3) Wipe down walls. Keeping your walls free of greasy fingerprints, dust and stains is as easy as wiping them with a damp microfiber cloth. Be sure to start from top to bottom, and bonus points if you wipe the door frames and baseboards too!

(4) Freshen up musty carpets. Refresh your carpets in between deep cleanings by using a <u>portable carpet cleaner</u> with a rotating brush. To rid your carpet of pet odors, sprinkle baking soda or carpet deodorizer on your carpet. Using a soft brush, work the baking powder into your carpet and let it set for 15 to 30 minutes. Vacuum the baking powder off the carpet with a fresh bag or clean dirt cup.

(5) De-stink the kitchen sink. Got kitchen stink you just can't kick? Try running a couple of lemon rind slivers through your garbage disposal and follow with cold water to get rid of any unwanted odors.

(6) Steam clean the microwave. Clean up those pesky tomato stains once and for all. To <u>clean your microwave</u>, fill a large microwave-safe bowl with 1 cup of water and a chopped-up lemon, lime, or orange or several tablespoons of vinegar and stick it inside. Turn the appliance on high for several minutes or until the solution boils and the window is steamy, then let it cool for five minutes before opening the door. Remove and wipe the inside and outside with a sponge.
(7) Bring stained cutting boards back to life. If you think that nasty mark is permanent, you're wrong! Run the cut side of a lemon over the board to help remove food stains and smells.

For an extra oomph, sprinkle it with salt or baking soda first.

(8) Remove hard water buildup from your shower head. Hard water buildup can cause stains and even affect your shower head's water flow. If scrubbing with a sponge doesn't clear the debris from the holes, you can <u>clean your shower</u> <u>head</u> and restore its flow using a few kitchen products you already have in your home. Mix equal parts white vinegar and water in a plastic bag and tie the bag around the shower head, making sure to immerse the shower head entirely in the

mixture. Tie the bag around the shaft for up to an hour, then wipe away any residue left behind and run the hot water of the shower to rinse the vinegar out of your shower.

(9) De-gunk your oven. <u>Cleaning your oven</u> is an essential part of spring cleaning. Use your appliance's self-cleaning function to remove stubborn, baked-on grime. If your oven doesn't have one, **place a hot**, wet cloth on top of burned spots to help soften the gunk. Then scrub with a sprinkle of baking powder and a heavy-duty pad. Rinse and wipe dry.

(10) Scrub down kitchen cabinets. Unsightly kitchen grime is a mix of dust and grease that builds up over time. Run the exhaust hood over your range every time you cook to keep grease from settling. To de-gunk, use a cabinet cleaner to cut through dirt and leave wood moisturized. Do an extra pass around any places that grease collects, like door and drawer pulls.

Slow Cooker or Instant Pot Chicken Tinga

Prep time: 10 minutes Servings: 6 Cook time: 6 hours Calories: 217 kcal

Chicken Tinga is an authentic Mexican stewed chicken that is subtly sweet, smokey, and spicy. This recipe requires minimal prep and can be made in a slow cooker or instant pot! Serve it folded

into tortillas for tacos, piled onto crispy tortillas for tostadas, on top of a salad, or stuffed into sweet potatoes for easy, quick meals any day of the week!

Ingredients:

- 1 10.75 ounce can tomato puree
- ½ cup water
- 2 teaspoons cornstarch

2 chipotle peppers in adobo sauce *Reserve the leftover chipotle peppers for another use

- 1 tablespoon adobo sauce from the chipotle peppers
- 2 tablespoons white wine vinegar
- 1 white onion roughly chopped
- 5 garlic cloves
- 2 teaspoons cumin
- 2 teaspoons dried oregano
- 2 teaspoons coriander
- 1 teaspoon chili powder
- $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon smoked paprika
- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 teaspoon salt

21/2 pounds boneless skinless chicken breast or chicken thighs 2 bay leaves

Instructions:

Slow Cooker: (1) Add all ingredients except chicken and bay leaves to a blender and blend on high until smooth. Add sauce to slow cooker with chicken and bay leaves. Stir to coat chicken. (2) Cook on high for 4-6 hours or low for 6-8. (3) Remove chicken to a large bowl and shred with two forks. Once shredded, return to sauce and toss to coat chicken. Serve with your favorite ingredients. See the instructions above for some suggestions!

Instant Pot: (1) Add all ingredients except chicken and bay leaves to a blender and blend on high until smooth. Add sauce to Instant Pot with chicken and bay leaves. Stir to coat chicken. (2) Cook on high pressure for 10 minutes or until chicken is cooked through. Quick release pressure when Instant Pot is done cooking. (3) Remove chicken to a large bowl and shred with two forks. Once shredded, return to sauce and toss to coat chicken. Serve with your favorite ingredients. See the instructions above for some suggestions!

The 2022 Whitley County 4-H Fair is just around the corner!! For 2022, Whitley County and the state of Indiana will be utilizing computer online enrollment for all 4-H

members to enter exhibits that will be shown at the Whitley County 4-H Fair. This program, called FairEntry, is

an internet-based program that is integrated with the 4hOnline program. THIS IS A MANDATORY REQUIREMENT!! ALL EXHIBITS – LIVESTOCK AND NON-LIVESTOCK – MUST BE ENTERED INTO FAIR ENTRY!!

The FairEntry program will be open beginning June 1, 2022 to July 1, 2022 for entering all livestock **AND** non-livestock exhibits. FairEntry will be the place that you will select your livestock classes and will choose the specific animal to be shown in that class based on the animals that were identified in 4hOnline. For non-livestock exhibits. this will be where you will enter the information on exactly what will be exhibited at the Whitley County 4-H Fair: for example, Black & White Salon Print, Sewing Wearable or Non-wearable, etc.

This will also be how we can enter those non-livestock exhibits that are selected to go to the Indiana State Fair. We will also be able to use this system to give reports to the local media and keep records of placings and awards.

<u>Helpful Hints on 4-H Posters &</u> <u>Notebooks</u>

All 4-H posters (regardless of project) must be displayed horizontal. Think of a 4-H exhibit poster like a dollar bill. You read the dollar bill horizontally and a poster is the same way.

• POSTERS MUST HAVE A HARD BACKING to make them stand when placed on the display easel. Use cardboard, foam board or lightweight wood.

• BE AWARE OF THE SIZE OF FOAM BOARD. A lot of foam board poster board for sale is 20"X30" – this is the wrong size – do not use! Your poster must be 22"X28". Foam poster board can be used if it correctly measures the 22"X28" size. The 22"X28" foam poster board is available at the Extension Office. Price is \$2.50.

• REMEMBER TO COVER YOUR POSTER with clear plastic for protection. Heavy duty acetate is available at hardware stores. Poster sleeves (\$1.00) and Salon print sleeves (\$.50) are available at the Extension Office.

• Please accommodate layout of poster to support 4-H Fair Entry tag 2-7/8" wide x 5-1/2" length in the lower right-hand corner.

<u>Be Patient on Roads</u> During Planting Season

It's time for my annual appeal to all to be patient and safe on roads during the spring planting season. From recent conversations I've had with farmers, I know they would echo that appeal as they try to get their work done as safely and efficiently as possible.

Slow-Moving Vehicle (SMV) emblems should be displayed on farm equipment and other slow-moving vehicles. An SMV emblem is a triangle shape, with an orange fluorescent center and red reflective borders. Equipment and other vehicles displaying this emblem are capable of speeds no faster than 25 miles per hour. Driving at road speed, the gap between you and the equipment will close quickly, so immediate caution and slower speeds are prudent.

Safety is always an important consideration, whether at home, on the road, or on the farm. Take time to be safe, be patient, and share the road this spring.



May/June Garden Calendar

(From Purdue Extension publications HO-91, HO-92)

Indoor Plants & Activities May

• Many indoor plants can be moved to a shady location outdoors after danger of frost is past (May). Plants will dry out more when kept outdoors, so check soil moisture often. Sinking the pots in the ground will help slow down moisture loss, but regular watering will still be necessary.

• Use cuttings of houseplants to increase your collection or share with your friends. Root the cuttings in media such as vermiculite, perlite, or potting soil rather than water. Roots grown in water tend to be weak from lack of oxygen and do not adjust well to being planted in soil.

June

• Indoor plants require more frequent watering and fertilizing as they increase their summer growth.

• Houseplants can be moved outdoors to a shady location, but pay close attention to their watering needs.

• Cut garden flowers for indoor beauty. Recut the stems again just before placing in water. Add a floral preservative and change the solution frequently.

• Root cuttings of houseplants and garden plants to increase your collection or share with a friend. Take cuttings from vigorously growing plants. Place cut end in rooting media, such as perlite, vermiculite, or peat moss soil mix. Enclose in perforated plastic, and keep out of direct sunlight.

Woody Landscape Plants & Fruit Trees May

• Thin fruits of apple (and other fruit trees if needed) about 3 weeks after petal fall. Apples should be spaced on the average of about 8 inches apart; peaches at 6 inches apart. If a large crop is set and no thinning is

<u>Growers,</u> Landscape Managers practiced, all fruit will be small and branches may break.

• Apply fungicide sprays to roses to control diseases such as black spot. • Prune early spring flowering trees and shrubs after flowers fade.

June

• Prune spring-flowering shrubs after blooms fade.

• Apply fungicide to prevent and control black spot on roses.

• Water newly planted trees and shrubs. Water deeply every 7 to 10 days when rain is lacking.

• Propagate deciduous shrubs, such as forsythia, lilac, pyracantha, and weigelia by stem-tip cuttings.

• Remove faded flowers and seed pods on lilac and other spring-flowering shrubs.



• Many Indiana trees are plagued by "lawn-mower blight." Be careful to avoid nicking tree trunks while mowing.

• Do not become alarmed at June drop of tree fruit. It is a natural thinning process for most trees to prevent excessive loads. Thin remaining excess fruit, if any exists, or prop up heavy branches to avoid breaking. Most fruit should be spaced 6 to 8 inches apart on a branch.

• Continue applications of home orchard fruit sprays to maintain problem-free fruit.

<u>Lawn</u> May

• Allow foliage of spring flowering bulbs to remain in place after blooms fade. Leaves manufacture the food reserves, which are then stored in the bulb for a repeat showing next year.

• Plant frost-tender plants after danger of frost is past for your area (mid-May in Northern Indiana, late April-early May in Southern Indiana.

 Pinch chrysanthemums and annual flower plants to keep them compact and well-branched.
 Make successive plantings of beans and sweet corn to extend the season of harvest.

• Thin seedlings of earlier planted crops such as carrots, lettuce, spinach, and beets to their proper spacing.

• Harvest early plantings of radishes, spinach, and lettuce.

• Harvest asparagus by cutting or snapping spears at, or just below, the soil level.



• Harvest rhubarb by cutting or by grasping the stalk and pulling up and slightly to one side.

• To prevent bacterial wilt in cucumbers, control cucumber beetles, the carriers of the disease, as soon as plants germinate or are transplanted.

• Remove blossoms from newly set strawberry plants to allow better runner formation.

• Remove unwanted sucker growth in raspberries when new shoots are about a foot tall.

June

• Keep grass mowed regularly, maintaining height at about one-half an inch higher than usual to help protect the crown of the plant from heat stress.

• Don't remove clippings from the lawn unless the grass is excessively tall or weedy. Clippings return some nutrients to the soil and do not add to thatch buildup.

• Water the lawn as needed to supply a total of 1 to 1-1/2 inches of water per week. Water deeply in a single application. Frequent, light sprinklings encourage roots to stay shallow, making them more susceptible to drought.

Flowers, Vegetables, and Small Fruits May

• Plant frost-tender plants after danger of frost is past for your area.

• Remove unwanted sucker growth in raspberries when new shoots are about a foot tall.

June

• Discontinue harvest of asparagus and rhubarb around mid-June to allow foliage to develop and store food reserves for next year's harvest. Fertilize and water when dry to promote healthy growth.

• Mulch to control weeds and conserve soil moisture after soil has warmed. Many materials such as straw, chopped corn cobs, bark chips, shredded paper, and grass clippings can be used.

• Blanch (exclude light from) cauliflower when heads are just 2 inches in diameter. Tie leaves up and over the developing head.

• Keep weeds controlled. They're easier to pull when they are still young.

• Plan now for your Halloween pumpkin. Determine the days to harvest for the particular cultivar you want to plant (usually on the seed packet), and count backwards from mid-October to determine the proper

planting date.

• Harvest spring plantings of broccoli, cabbage, and peas.

• Remove cool-season plants,

such as radish, spinach and lettuce as they bolt, or form seed stalks, during hot, summer weather.

• Continue planting carrots, beans, and sweet corn for successive harvests.

• For staked tomatoes, remove suckers (a branch that forms where the leaf joins the stem) while they are 1 to 1-1/2 inches long to allow for easier training.

• Remove spent blooms of peony, iris, delphiniums, and other flowers.

Pinch shoot tips of chrysanthemums, impatiens, petunias, and coleus to promote bushier growth.

• Remove tops of spring-flowering bulbs only after they have yellowed and withered.

• Continue planting gladiolus for a succession of bloom.

• Pick strawberries from the garden or a pick-your own operation.

• Protect ripening strawberries from birds by using netting.

• Supplement natural rainfall to supply a total of 1 to 1-1/2 inches of water per week to the garden. Water deeply once per week rather than frequent light sprinkling.
