Purdue Extension. Education is our mission and it is a cooperative effort between national (United States Department of Agriculture), state (Purdue University and the state of Indiana) and local (Whitley County Commissioners and County Council) resources. We provide education so young people can gain life skills and adults can make informed decisions.

Purdue Extension Offices, Extension Educators and Extension Specialists live and work in all 92 counties in Indiana. Jacki Bishop, office manager, works with the HHS and ANR program areas; Lisa Schrader, office coordinator, works with the 4-H program; and Candy Sroufe, program assistant, works with the 4-H programs/fair. Alissa Roberts and Stacy Geiger, summer program assistants, focus on 4-H summer activities.

Indiana Extension Homemakers Assoc. (IEHA) Oct. 17-22, 2022

The Indiana Extension Homemakers Association (IEHA) is a statewide organization in Indiana and was founded in 1913. I am proud to say that our organization is active in 88 of the 92 counties. Our mission is "To strengthen families through continuing education, leadership development and volunteer community support." Whitley County joined IEHA in 1924 as the woman's auxiliary of Farm Bureau. Our objectives in 1924 were educational in nature and we promoted the advancement within homes and community life. We also took pride in encouraging youth to achieve their highest potential throughout the 4-H program, as well as prepare them for a successful future. We are proud to say that we continue to live out these objectives today.

So, what does our community involvement look like? The ladies in Whitley County continue to be very involved in the community, including volunteering at the County 4-H Fair. Our 4-H Fair involvement began years ago in the shelter house with a menu of hot beef, hot dogs, sloppy joes and homemade pies. We continue to volunteer and prepare homemade style meals each year. After some time, a fund was established and a new building was built. In 1953, the 4-H Center "Up on the Hill" was finished and gave us the opportunity to prepare meals in a new kitchen! Our organization continues to prepare meals at the fair and we are proud to say that we will be celebrating our 70th year in 2023!

Fundraising is another key component. It truly has become an integral part of our program. It helps to support, not only our youth but our community as a whole. We organize and volunteer with several annual events, such as the Adult Open Show at the County 4-H Fair, Holiday Craft Bazaar, and the Spring and Fall Garage Sales. These events help us raise money to fund many of our community projects. Every October we celebrate our organization statewide in hopes to recruit new members and expand within communities. Are you interested in giving back to Whitley County? Anyone is welcome to join our organization! There are no requirements and we are an equal opportunity organization.

Focus Groups

Each year volunteers are needed to serve on the IEHA Focus Groups and Activity Committees. All members are eligible to apply. Holding a county office is not a requirement.

Focus groups will meet with the Chair one or two times each year. Focus Days are currently held in Noblesville, Indiana at the Hamilton County Extension Complex. All groups meet on Focus Days making car pools possible.

Activity Committees may meet, or function by e-mail, mail or phone. Attendance at Home and Family Conference is encouraged for Activity Committees and Focus Groups.

Appointments are made by the State President Elect with recommendations from the IEHA State Board. Completing the application does not insure placement on a committee. Appointments are for a one-year term. **You must re-apply each year**.

Individuals MAY NOT serve more than 2(two) consecutive years on the same Focus Group or Activity Committee. This is to give others the opportunity to serve on different committees.

Focus Groups include: Education, Leadership and Volunteer Community Support.

Activity Committees include: Cultural Arts/Heritage Skills, Silent Auction/Conference Event,

8 Steps for a Debt-Free Holiday

Stores across America have their festive seasonal displays up, carols are being played over the loud speaker and giant signs are posted boasting stellar deals. Have you and your loved ones created a holiday budget? If you have not created one, that's alright. It is never too late! Here are some smart spending tips that you can add to your current budget or that you can use to create one for a debt-free holiday!



1. Set and stick to a budget! A holiday budget should start like every good budget: by looking at how much you have left over after paving for those essentials. How much can you reasonably spend without getting into trouble? Take a look at your monthly expenses and then set a holiday spending amount that won't put a strain on your wallet. From there, make a list of gifts you need, and set a reasonable amount per person based on your spending limit. Resist the urae! Those extra dollars can really add up. So, once you meet the set budget for each person on your list, cross them off and be done!

Minestrone Soup

Servings: 11

A great fall, easy recipe that the whole family will enjoy!

- 2 large carrots, diced
- 2 celery ribs, chopped
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1 teaspoon garlic salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 1¹/₂ cups shredded cabbage 1 tablespoon dried basil
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1¹/₂ teaspoons dried parsley flakes
- 2 cans (14¹/₂ ounces each) reduced-sodium chicken broth
- 2 cans (8 ounces each) no-salt-added tomato sauce
- 1 can (16 ounces) kidney beans, rinsed and drained
- 1 can (15 ounces) chickpeas, rinsed and drained
- 1 can (141/2 ounces) diced tomatoes, undrained
- 1 cup uncooked whole wheat elbow macaroni

1. In a large saucepan, sauté the carrots, celery and onion in 1 tablespoon olive oil and until tender.

2. Stir in the broth, tomato sauce, beans, chickpeas, tomatoes, cabbage, basil, parsley, garlic salt, oregano and pepper. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat: cover and simmer for 15

minutes. Add macaroni; cook, uncovered, 6-8 minutes or until macaroni and vegetables are tender. Ladle soup into bowls and enjoy!

* How long will it last in my fridge? You can keep minestrone soup in the fridge for up to a week.

* Freeze option: Cool soup and put into freezer containers. Be sure to label your containers so you remember what it is. Before eating, partially thaw in refrigerator overnight. To heat, add contents to saucepan, stirring occasionally and adding a little broth or water if necessary. Minestrone will last up to six months in your freezer.

Private Applicator License Renewals

The Office of the Indiana State Chemist recently sent renewal notices pesticide applicators with to certification expiration 12-31-2022. If you received a mailing, it included the number of Private Applicator Programs Recertification (PARPs) recorded at the time of mailing (3 required).

If you have accumulated the 3 required PARPs within the 5-year period of your license, submit the renewal form sent to you with the required license fee. If you need another program, do not submit the form before you have attended the third program.

If you need another PARP, you may choose to attend the program I have organized on Dec. 7 (see next article), or attend any other one being offered in the area. See https://ppp.purdue.edu/privateapplicators/recertification-parp/parpevents/.

The expiration date of successfully renewed applicators will be 12-31-2027.

Indiana State Board of Animal Health (BOAH) Announces Upcoming Changes to Access to Antibiotics

BOAH recently announced upcoming changes to laws that will affect access to animal antibiotics for livestock and pets. At issue is antimicrobial stewardship of medically important (MI) antibiotics.

They report that the US Food & Drug Administration (FDA) developed objectives to improve antimicrobial stewardship in veterinary medicine under FDA's Guidance for Industry (GFI) #263:

- ensure MI antibiotics are used for treatment, control and prevention of disease--not growth promotion or feed efficiency; and
- bring all use of MI antibiotics under the supervision of veterinarians.

Changes FDA has recently made to availability of antibiotics in veterinary medicine accomplish these goals:

- all MI antibiotics for use in feed now require a Veterinary Feed Directive (VFD)
- all MI antibiotics for use in water now require a veterinary prescription
- remaining MI antibiotics (those currently over-the-counter) will require a prescription by June 2023. Over-the-counter MI antibiotics will no longer be available for food animals and companion animals.

FDA's GFI #263 has been in an implementation period since June 2021.

A veterinary client patient relationship (VCPR) is the connection between a veterinarian, his/her client, and the animal patient(s). A valid VCPR is required for veterinarians to prescribe drugs or direct an extralabel drug use, particularly in their absence.

BOAH also emphasizes that antimicrobial stewardship means responsibly using the **right drug** at the **right dose** at the **right time** for the **right duration**.

Land Values, Cash Rents and Leasing Contracts

This is the time of year that many cash rent contracts are renewed and sometimes renegotiated. Keep in mind that many factors go into what makes a "fair" cash rent, negotiated between landlord and tenant. These may include who gets government program payments from Farm Service Agency, who applies lime, whether roadsides are mowed, fertility program maintenance, and a host of other factors.

Opinion surveys conducted by Purdue University Department of Agricultural Economics and by USDA/Indiana Agricultural Statistics Service (see links below) may help with these discussions. Remember that these are opinion surveys, polled from ag professionals and farmers, and not based on hard data. They are designed to "get you in the ballpark" in your discussions.
